Six-month Review of Mutual Support Working Group Project: Moving Toward Restoring Justice for Priests

Earlier this year, the Mutual Support Working Group of AUSCP completed a two-year analysis of the critical issue concerning the lack of due process extended to accused priests and found a reported pattern of multiple infractions of Canon Law committed by bishops and superiors. These infractions have gravely harmed the reputation of priests, caused deep emotional and psychological harm, and eroded the faithful's trust in the Church's commitment to justice. The infractions cited include:

- The imposition of premature penalties before a priest has had the opportunity to defend themselves.
- Publishing the names of priests as accused before substantial and verifiable evidence has been gathered and the investigation completed, including the naming of deceased priests who are unable to defend themselves.
- Continued freezing of priests from their ministry even when no credible evidence is found.

The Association of United States Catholic Priests (AUSCP) reached out to Pope Leo with a heartfelt letter, expressing their prayers and support for his leadership. The letter, announced at the association's annual meeting on June 24th, also highlighted the critical issue concerning the lack of due process extended to accused priests.
